

INTRODUCING WESTERN WASHINGTON UNIVERSITY


In the northwest corner of Washington state, nestled near the Salish Sea and not far from Mt. Baker.







We used the Digital Commons Book Gallery, which allows for the publishing of book covers. A dramatic display of this previously published journal was the result.

























