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Weaverling Spit Clam Surveying



When you arrive, there will be red flags (in lines called *transects*) indicating where you'll be digging

Using a 1 ft² ring, dig one foot deep and place everything on the sorting board




Carefully sort through the sediment and set aside the clams you find

Pay careful attention to not miss the little ones! They can be really tiny, so don't rush and make sure you're being diligent. The small ones can also be harder to identify, so don't be afraid to ask if you aren't 100% sure.







Measuring

You'll be measuring the clams along their *longest axis* using plastic calipers. Make sure you're careful with your measurements and are as accurate as possible.
